**We welcome The Revd Canon Ruth Pyke to preside and preach at Mass on 23 August

Bartholomew(s)

Monday 24 August is the festival of Bartholomew the Apostle. Bartholomew is included in lists of the 12 Apostles in the gospels of Matthew (10.2-4), Mark (3.16-19); Luke (6.14-16) and Acts (1.13). Bartholomew's name appears next to Peter's in the three gospels. John's gospel records Philip's calling of Nathaniel (John 1.43-47):

Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth.' Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.' When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!'

Nathaniel appears again in John's gospel (21.2) in Jesus' appearance to the disciples at the Sea of Tiberias after the resurrection. Bartholomew is not mentioned in John's gospel, nor is Nathanael in the other three gospels. This has led many scholars to identify Nathaniel with Bartholomew.

There is another Bartholomew though, particularly significant at the start of September and that is His All Holiness Patriarch Bartholomew, the 270th successor of the Apostolic See of St Andrew. On 13 August he celebrated the 65th anniversary of his ordination to the diaconate with a celebration of the Divine Liturgy on the Turkish island where he was born, Imbros. He has served as Ecumenical Patriarch for 35 years. At the conclusion of the service he spoke these words:

... I thank the most gracious God for the supreme gift of the priesthood: eight years as a deacon, four as a priest, 18 as a metropolitan and 35 as Ecumenical Patriarch, in the service of the entire Christian community under the dominion of the Lord, of the Great Church, of inter-Orthodox cooperation, inter-Christian and interreligious dialogues, peace and solidarity, the protection of the natural environment and the encounter between the Church and the contemporary world," His All-Holiness stressed. 'Not to be served, but to serve'

The clue to his particular significance at this time of year is not in his years of service, important though that is, but in the phrase 'protection of the natural environment ...' Patriarch Bartholomew's immediate predecessor, Dimitrios I, suggested in 1989 that churches observe 1 September (the first day of the Orthodox church year) as a day "of the protection of the natural environment" and to offer "prayers for and supplications to the Maker of all, both in thanksgiving for the great gift of creation and in petition for its protection and salvation". Patriarch Bartholomew took up the baton on his election. One Orthodox author wrote that when Bartholomew became Ecumenical Patriarch:

Bartholomew outlined the dimensions of his leadership and vision ... the continuation of ecumenical engagements with other Christian churches and confessions, the intensification of interreligious dialogue for peaceful coexistence; *and the initiation of discussion and action for the protection of the environment against ecological pollution and destruction*. [Emphasis in original]

Patriarch Bartholomew was a major inspiration for Pope Francis's encyclical letter *Laudato Si'* – Care for our Common Home (2015).

[Bartholomew has] spoken in particular of the need for each of us to repent of the ways we have harmed the planet, for "inasmuch as we all generate small ecological damage", we are called to acknowledge "our contribution, smaller or greater, to the disfigurement and destruction of creation". He has repeatedly stated this firmly and persuasively, challenging us to acknowledge our sins against creation: "For human beings... to destroy the biological diversity of God's creation; for human beings to degrade the integrity of the earth by causing changes in its climate, by stripping the earth of its natural forests or destroying its wetlands; for human beings to contaminate the earth's waters, its land, its air, and its life – these are sins". For "to commit a crime against the natural world is a sin against ourselves and a sin against God".

It is through his efforts and those of many more across all Christian denominations that the period from 1 September to 4 October (the festival of St Francis of Assisi) is now designated *The Season of Creation* and most recently a new festival has been introduced, the *Feast of Creation in Christ*, for the first Sunday in September. In the Church of England this was given final approval by General Synod in July this year.

The Church of England has produced a set of resources for Creation and the Environment called *A Time for Creation*. The second edition (July 2026) incorporates resources for the Feast of Creation in Christ and is available in printed form and online. <https://www.churchofengland.org/prayer-and-worship/worship-texts-and-resources/time-creation>

Worship

August The celebrants and preachers for August are: 23 August, The Revd Canon Ruth Pyke; 30 August, The Revd Dr Jennifer Brown. [*Apologies: I wrote Fr AKMA rather than Jennifer Brown in the last issue of this pew leaflet. Ed.*]

[23-29 August] Monday is the festival of Bartholomew the Apostle. Commemorations include Thursday: Monica, Mother of Augustine of Hippo, 387; Friday: Augustine, bishop, teacher of the faith, 430; Saturday: Beheading of John the Baptist.

[30 August – 5 September] Commemorations include Monday: Aidan, bishop, missionary, 651; Tuesday: Giles, hermit, c. 710; Wednesday: Martyrs of Papua New Guinea, 1901, 1942; Thursday: Gregory the Great, bishop, teacher of the faith, 604; Friday: Birinus, bishop, 650.

1 September has been designated a World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation. The theme for the Season of Creation 2026 is "living water", based on Ezekiel 47:1-12. God's life-giving water flows from the temple of God, growing deeper, restoring barren land, reviving waters, and sustaining flourishing ecosystems. In the Roman Catholic Church Pope Leo has chosen the theme "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks" (Is 2:4), "highlight[ing] the connection between armed conflict and environmental degradation."

News from Tariro Fr Nicolas CR has sent out two mailings to supporters in the last fortnight. In the first a student of the College of the Resurrection at Mirfield writes about her recent visit to Tariro projects in Zimbabwe as a summer placement. I will quote two extracts that illustrate some of the project work being undertaken, helping to prepare the young people for employment and for some setting up their own businesses.

Arriving at the Tariro House, I was welcomed with generous hospitality. One of the young people studying hospitality had prepared a hearty meal of rice and stew, which we ate together in their living area, and then had a tour of the rest of the house and garden. I was shown the 'roadrunner' enclosure where incredibly fast chickens (hence their name!) lived, and the nursery where handfuls of chicks were being raised – these, once grown, would be bred or sold as an initiative to raise money which would then contribute to the ongoing cycle of care, education and employment.

Another initiative I was shown was the budding 'household cleaning product' project. An encouraging order had arrived for 48 bottles of washing up liquid, and careful sorting and preparing was done to ensure the customer would be happy with order fulfilment, which an adult sibling of the house who was visiting would deliver.

At the end of the trip the student visited the Anglican CZR (The Community of the Holy Name) Sisters convent which sits in the grounds of St Augustine's Mission School, Penhalonga. She wrote:

Faith is the foundation of Tariro, and I saw this deeply during the last weekend of my stay which was graced with the arrival of ten Tariro youngsters from the village of Tsvingwe who travelled in a group to stay at the convent in order to take some time to prepare for their confirmations in September. We spent the rest of the day exploring sacred spaces, furniture and vessels, liturgies, creeds, faith and prayer, and experiencing reading and interpreting scripture from the lectern; interspersed with shared meals with the CZR Sisters and praying the offices. I was really moved at the way in which they knew one another, playfully encouraging and caring for each other's needs, and vividly aware of the opportunity their education and connection through Tariro brought them.

In his second email, Fr Nicolas wrote:

Finally, I am off to Zimbabwe on 1 September along with two of our Trustees: Adam and Lizzie Wilson. We will visit the main centres and make plans with our colleagues out there to help Tariro in Zimbabwe become more self-reliant.

Let us pray for the work of Tariro, the Tariro family and the Trustees of the charity.

The Middle East This prayer for Iran appeared in diocesan e-News, and on the Church of England web site. It has also been reproduced in the March issue of *A Candle in the Window*. The prayer was written by the Rt Revd Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, Bishop of Chelmsford. Bishop Guli was born in Iran. Her family left the country in the wake of the Iranian Revolution in 1980, when she was 13 years old, and to date she has been unable to return.
