#### We welcome Fr AKMA to celebrate and preach at Mass today

## Today's Gospel: Matthew 3.1-12 - The Proclamation of John the Baptist

Our readings this week include St Matthew's account of the preaching of John the Baptist, which provides an occasion for noticing some of the distinctive ways that the evangelists characterise this fascinating figure from the time of Jesus. For instance, to tackle a big topic first, St Matthew doesn't seem to have heard that John might be related to Jesus (nor do Mark and John; only Luke mentions a family connection between the two). As in Mark, so in Matthew, John simply appears out of nowhere proclaiming the nearness of the Kingdom and his own role as herald of the One Who Is To Come. St Matthew is the only evangelist who suggests that John felt there was anything awkward about his baptising Jesus, but even at this point Matthew doesn't imply that they were cousins; John just seems to know that Jesus was a greater authority than he (John) was. And when John was in prison, he sent messengers to Jesus asking whether he was the One; evidently he didn't definitely recognise Jesus as the one who was more powerful than himself.

However, St Matthew does tell us to think of John as the second coming of Elijah, greater than anyone ever before him. This is one of Matthew's favourite ways of describing Jesus, so it's likely that he really did hold this mysterious prophet of repentance and renewal as second only to Jesus in importance. As such, he's amply worth studying in depth — how the other evangelists describe him, and what we learn about him from sources outside the New Testament (for instance, what Mandaean religious sources say about him). In the meantime, we can repeat and live by the message that he made his trademark: Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand! *Fr AKMA*

BISHOP GAVIN TO TAKE THREE-MONTH SABBATICAL From Diocesan eNews, 27 November.

"Bishop Gavin announced this week that he has been granted a three-month sabbatical, running for the months of December, January and February. He has several things lined up for this period, including a ministry trip to Peru to revisit churches and communities he worked with more than 30 years ago. But the main emphasis of the time will be to recharge his batteries, physically and spiritually, in preparation for the additional responsibility of being Acting Diocesan Bishop after Bishop Steven's retirement next summer."

<u>Prophets</u> As the saying goes, "and now for something completely different". Once in a while one reads an article in a magazine that contains an unexpected twist. Such was my experience last week on reading an interview with Professor Penny Endersby, Chief Executive of the Met Office published in *Ingenia*, the magazine of the Royal Academy of Engineering. The twist was that one of the accompanying photographs was taken in Exeter Cathedral with the caption "... Penny Endersby became canon scientist at the cathedral...". She was appointed a Lay Canon in September 2023 and what struck me as unusual though was her title, Canon Scientist. One is used to Canon Treasurer, Canon Librarian, Canon Missioner, Canon Theologian, but Canon Scientist?

I wondered how many other cathedrals have Canon Scientists. A web search for the term found a few examples. The Revd Canon Dr Mike Kirby, a radiotherapy physicist and honorary lecturer at the University of Liverpool, was appointed Canon Scientist of Liverpool Cathedral in 2020. Tom McLeish, Professor of Natural Philosophy in the Department of Physics at the University of York and a Licensed Lay Minister, was installed as Canon Scientist of St Albans Cathedral, in November 2021 (a fixed-term appointment), followed by Russell Cowburn, Professor of Experimental Physics at the University of Cambridge, in February 2025. At St Alban's the role of Canon Scientist is described as encouraging "deeper dialogue and exploration of how scientific discovery can complement theological reflection" and he gave an inaugural lecture entitled "Invisible Wonders: Nanotechnology and the God of Creation".

I then wondered if other disciplines apart from theology are represented in the titles of canons. A very quick, certainly non-exhaustive, search found a Canon Historian at Salisbury Cathedral, historian and broadcaster Tom Holland who was installed in June this year and is described on the cathedral's web site as "the first Canon Historian to be appointed in an English cathedral."

But are there no Canon Engineers? It seems not as such, but there are canons who are engineers. Here in Oxford, Canon Professor Lionel Tarassenko (now Lord and president of Reuben College Oxford), a prominent British engineer and academic, serves as a Lay Canon of Christ Church Cathedral, being appointed to this honorary position in May 2012, and among the first lay canons in the cathedral's history. The Revd Canon Dr Tim Bull, a residentiary canon at St Alban's Cathedral and Director of Ordinands in that diocese, lectured in software engineering at the University of Durham prior to ordination. In October this year he gave a course at Salisbury Cathedral on "AI: Questions of Faith - Should we embrace this technology with open arms or approach it with caution?"

Does this have anything to do with the theme for Advent 2 – The Prophets? The question that came to my mind, such as it is, was "Are scientists prophets?" and since AI was mentioned in the last paragraph, I thought to ask a couple of Large Language Models (LLMs). The full answers are too long to include here, so with the risk of bias, I will just include short extracts. Interested readers are encouraged to try this at home, but beware that in general LLMs do not necessarily give the same answer when the question is repeated.

Firstly, a simple Google search with this question, The AI Overview to Google search's answer started:

No, scientists are not prophets, as they use empirical evidence and the scientific method, not divine revelation, to explain the natural world. However, some public scientists adopt a "prophetic ethos" to persuade the public to take action on issues like climate change by framing their work with a sense of urgency and moral authority, a phenomenon explored in works like *Scientists as Prophets: A Rhetorical Genealogy* by Lynda Walsh.

The answer then expands on differences between scientists and prophets (basis for claims, nature of predictions, falsifiability) and similarities and overlaps (public role, charismatic authority, moral dimension). It is valuable to click on the "link" icon at the end of each answer which shows links to sources.

The second experiment was with Microsoft's Copilot "Your AI companion", using the default ChatGPT5 engine.

That's a fascinating question—it touches on philosophy, history, and even theology. Let's break it down: Scientists vs. Prophets

#### Scientists

- Seek truth through observation, experimentation, and evidence.
- Their authority comes from reproducible results and peer review.
- They deal with the natural world, aiming to explain how things work.

## **Prophets**

- Traditionally claim insight through divine revelation or spiritual vision.
- Their authority comes from faith, charisma, or religious tradition.
- They deal with meaning, morality, and the purpose of existence.

Then follows more comparison and a heading "A Thought-Provoking Angle".

Some argue that scientists *function like modern prophets* because they reveal hidden truths and warn humanity about consequences (e.g., nuclear weapons, climate change). But unlike prophets, they don't claim divine authority—only human reasoning and evidence.

So, scientists aren't prophets in the traditional sense, but they sometimes play a **prophetic role** in society by foreseeing dangers and urging change.

The answer concludes with an invitation to delve deeper.

Would you like me to explore this idea from a **philosophical lens** (e.g., Karl Popper, Thomas Kuhn) or a **cultural lens** (e.g., how society treats scientists like prophets)?

I did submit a follow-up prompt to Copilot "What sources did you consult for this answer?"

For my earlier answer, I didn't consult any external sources — it was based on general knowledge and reasoning. followed with an offer to look up relevant references.

I will not comment on these answers, neither content nor style, leaving that as textbooks say, as an exercise to the reader. Almighty God, from whom all thoughts of truth and peace proceed: kindle, we pray, in the hearts of all, the true love of peace and guide with your pure and peaceable wisdom those who take counsel for the nations of the earth that in tranquillity your kingdom may go forward, till the earth is filled with the knowledge of your love; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, ...

Most holy God and Father, hear our prayers for all who strive for peace and all who fight for justice. Help us, who today remember the cost of war, to work for a better tomorrow; and, as we commend to you lives lost in terror and conflict, bring us all, in the end, to the peace of your presence; through Christ our Lord.

God our Father, your Son is our peace and his cross the sign of reconciliation: help us, who share the broken bread, to bring together what is scattered and to bind up what is wounded, that Christ may bring in the everlasting kingdom of his peace; who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.
